Route 66 Harley-Davidson and TTC Education Foundation Announce Scholarship for Automotive and Motorcycle/Power Products Technology Students

\$2,400 Scholarship Fund Created

Tulsa, Okla. (October 12, 2005) Route 66 Harley-Davidson, 3637 S. Memorial Dr., has partnered with the Tulsa Technology Education Foundation to establish a scholarship fund for Tulsa Technology Center students enrolled in Automotive or Motorcycle/Power Products Technology Programs.

The Route 66 Harley-Davidson scholarship is designed to encourage and assist automotive and motorcycle power products education. The program also serves the public interest by aiding in the education of men and women to become qualified to practice in the automotive, motorcycle and power products field.

“Tulsa Technology Center’s impact on the City of Tulsa is extremely positive. We wanted to support students who were interested in making a career in the automotive and motorcycle field,” says Larry Wofford, Owner, Route 66 Harley-Davidson. “The Tulsa Technology Center Education Foundation has been helping students achieve their educational goals.”

Nationally recognized, Tulsa Tech's Automotive Service Excellence (ASE) certified training program allows students to chart a plan that includes orientation and fundamentals before branching out to a selection of specialty areas that include: (1) Automatic Transmissions/Transaxles, (2) Brakes, (3) Electrical and Electronic Systems, (4) Engine Performance, (5) Heating and Air Conditioning, (6) Suspension/Steering, and (7) Manual Drive Train and Axles. With the opportunity to earn valuable industry certifications, students may enter the workforce or opt to apply credit toward an associate degree and beyond.

Tulsa Tech's Motorcycle/Power Products Technology program provides training to develop entry-level skills in the outdoor power equipment and motorcycle service industry. Students study safety, tools, measurement, and engine principles as well as repair aspects of fuel, electrical and drive systems common to lawn and garden equipment, ATVs and motorcycles.

The Tulsa Technology Center Education Foundation was founded in 1983 to provide for student needs that could not be funded with public tax dollars. Without the financial assistance of the Foundation, many students would not complete educational programs and acquire the skills and work ethic to become self-supporting citizens. Today, the Foundation continues that tradition. By promoting the pursuit of education, employability, and quality of life, it plays a vital role in the economic development of the community.
